









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Beating 'Em To the Punch by Rick Berger Member: HUB Camera Club Livingston Camera Club

If you compete in camera club competitions or have observed a few, at one time or another you've probably seen a judge become overly critical of an image, sometimes getting so picky that the phrase "constructive criticism" seems to fall by the wayside. Here are a few tips to avoid judge abuse and perhaps beat them at their own game.

The key to the strategy begins when you look at an image that you're considering entering into a competition. First, like an actor, begin by getting into character. Turn yourself into the most despicable, petty, nitpicking old fuddy duddy imaginable. Pretend that you're the Scrooge of all judges.

The next step is to look at your image with an overly critical eye. First, look at the most obvious and glaring mistakes. Scrutinize the exposure and color. Question whether it's simply too light or too dark. Are the highlights as white as vanilla ice cream on a snow bank? Are the shadows reminiscent of melted tar on black asphalt? Are the colors believable or saturated to a cartoon-like hue? Now check the composition. Does it help the shot to tell a meaningful story? Does it draw you into the picture making you feel like part of the scene? Most of you can take it from there and look for the other major factors that contribute to producing a good photograph such as cropping, the use of leading lines etc.

Now, let's get back to that nitpicky judge. Try to anticipate what'll really bug him or her. The eye is first attracted to the lightest parts of a photo. You know that guy in the upper left corner of your photo? Yeah, that guy...the one wearing that glaring white shirt. Clone him out! Burn him in! Send him packing! Do whatever you have to before that judge has a chance to make mention of the "distracting guy in the white shirt." See that branch cutting across the lower portion of the daffodil in your garden shot? Zap it! Look at the top of the lady's hat in your portrait. It's just touching the top edge of the image. Re-edit and give it some breathing space.

Another way to win against Judge Picky is to develop what's been called OCD...Obsessive Cropping Disorder. How many times have you heard a judge say, "It would have been much better if you had cropped it tighter. All that background stuff is distracting?" Now I'm not a big advocate of extremely tight cropping when you shoot. That's a throwback to the days of slides when it was "What you shoot is what you get." Too often I've cropped too tightly in the camera and struggled with the image on my computer wishing I had left more room around the subject so I'd have more to work with in terms of composition.

I think by now you've gotten my drift. Beat yourself up before your photo gets trounced in a room filled with people staring at it on a screen.

*A note to all of you judges out there...

We really do appreciate your efforts and realize that the criticism is designed to help us become better photographers. It's our job to scrutinize our images with a critical eye before submitting them to a competition. If you do this diligently, you may be the next recipient of a "9!"
