WELCOME TO 2017-18

It's great to report the beginning of the 65th year of the New Jersey Federation of Camera Clubs. We hope you all had a great summer. We're also hoping you got some terrific images that we'll be able to see some in upcoming competitions.

Thanks to those clubs that were able to update their website calendars so I was able to include some September events in this issue!

Noteworthy Items:

After at least 18 years meeting at the Watchung Art Center, the location for our Delegates Meetings has been changed. We will now gather at the **Cranford Community Center**, **220 Walnut Street**, **Cranford**, **NJ**. Meetings will continue to begin at 7:30 p.m.

The scoring system for all NJFCC competitions has been changed from 3-9 to a range of **6-9**.

The number of entries per maker for Projected Image Competitions has changed from 3 to 2 for the 2017-2018 competition season. (Prints will stay at 3 per maker.)

Pictorial Competitions have been updated to include 3 categories (similar to Nature): 1. Creative, 2. Pictorial Nature, 3. Open. Pictorial Nature includes "nature-like images" that don't qualify for Nature Competitions.

About Face! By Rick Berger HUB Camera Club



Ever hear a judge at a camera club competition say something like, "It would've been better if we could see the person's face"? Consider this...On occasion, maybe it wouldn't have been better to see his or her face. Perhaps the image tells the story more powerfully by just showing the person's back! If there's motion involved, there may be more impact in the shot if we see the subject walking or running away, storming off in a fit of anger, or departing the scene with his head down (portraying dejection, sorrow etc.) than if we see that person facing us. For example, in 1945, Associated Press photographer Joe Rosenthal shot a picture of a group of US Marines triumphantly raising a flag attached to a salvaged water pipe while standing atop Mount Suribachi, the highest point on the Japanese island of Iwo Jima. In this Pulitzer Prize photo, all we see are the backs and sides of the Marines. Not one face can be seen.

In 1939 photographer Horst P. Horst (Don't you just love that name?) gave the world his most famous and iconic image...that of a young woman in a corset. This shot, taken just days before the beginning of World War II, reminds us of some classical statues. What we see is the model's back, not her face.



If we go back into history and take a look at art we'll see that here too, backs sometimes dominated the work. In 1583, sculptor Giovanni Bologna gave us his "The Rape of the Sabine Woman." The predominant figure is one whose Back faces us. We can't see his face at all!

One of my favorites from the art world is Andrew Wyeth's 1948 painting, "Christina's World." Here we see a woman crawling up a hill through a field while looking toward an isolated house in the dis tance. We see nothing more than her back. We can't see her face at all! Yet, the painting tells a story. (Many, however, argue about what that story is.)




When we attend a theater performance, we'll often witness the power of the back. A most striking example of this occurred a number of years ago during a concert at New York's Palace Theater. As the curtain opened we saw nothing more than a silhouette of the star's back. One arm was raised. A bright spotlight created an aura around her. The music began. Only then did Liza Minnelli turn toward the audience and begin to sing. Up until that point this dramatic opening was punctuated only by the sight of her back.

Can inanimate objects also tell a powerful tale if we see no more than the back of the object? Sometimes! I've seen shots of trains departing a station where the lens caught the tail end of the train. As the train disappears into the distance we see the back of the caboose. With just the right combination of lighting, exposure and composition, a more dramatic story may unfold than if we had seen the front of the train coming toward us.

So how do we apply this method of shooting backs to our photography? First, we need to understand that it's perfectly "legal" to take pictures of the backs of people and things. One of the perks of shooting a person's back is that you don't have to worry about a model release! Secondly, it's a fun challenge to see if you can tell a story without showing the subject's face. This might even make a good theme for a club competition.

Lest we get hung up on folks whose backs are turned toward the camera, let's consider those subjects whose bodies are facing our lens, yet their faces are only partially (or fully) obscured. Perhaps the individual's body language tells the story. A ballet dancer may glance down at the stage or bend forward so we can no longer see her face yet she is still able to convey an emotion or convince us that she's a graceful swan bowing her head. The examples are endless. Just look around in a supermarket, on a crowded train, or at a cocktail party. Though bodies may face us with faces hidden, often they still convey a wealth of information. I often look for these moments when street shooting. They're elusive, but quite rewarding when you capture them.









So go ahead and fearlessly aim your lens at someone's back or one who's turned toward you but whose face may be turned away or obscured. Just avoid shooting a rear view of your pet bulldog or that zebra at the zoo. Maybe that's one time where you may be better off aiming at the face!



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
